BRODIECLUB ANNUAL FIELD DAY 1999

The 1999 Brodie Club Field Day was held on June 26 at the country home of Jock McAndrews in Codrington, north of Brighton. Ann, Sandra Eadie and I drove out in the morning. I had conveniently forgotten to bring directions and didn't know which house to visit. Queries in town drew a blank but some did allow that the folks in the big house with the cupola came from the city on weekends. We turned into the drive and were reassured by !he licence plate DOCJOC . Indeed this was the place and we were welcomed by Jock, Bill Carrick and his grandson Zachary who were there ahead of us.

For a time we visited the neighbour, Len Jackson, a retired teacher whose hobby is constructing models of old buildings in his yard. There was a town hall, a railway station, a church, and stores and houses. We wandered among them admiring the craftsmanship. Back at Jock's house which was built in the 1880s and now bears the name 'Dunpollen,' we were treated to a tour of the partly restored interior and a variety of curiosities, old and new.

Before lunch we visited the nearby creek and yours truly managed to net a few fish - Redbelly Dace, Black-nosed Dace, and a Brook Stickleback. Birds were singing in the garden - a Redstart, Red-eyed Vireo, Catbird and several others. It became quite warm but there was a cooling breeze on the porch that Jock had added to the house. Norm Martin arrived and we all had lunch. At one point, Sandra upon entering the house asked what bird had called - it was the one o'clock oriole on Jock's bird clock.

After a leisurely lunch we all (plus Jock's dog) set out by car to visit various points of interest. Wild Turkeys failed to show - wrong time of day. We soon found ourselves viewing a gravel operation that exposed a cross section of the Codrington esker. Bank Swallows were much in evidence.

Next stop was at the Goodrich-Loomis Conservation Area where we saw Ebony Jewelwings (damselflies) flitting over a stream. In an old field, we viewed beautiful clumps of Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosa) in full bloom. Then it was on to the old Red Cloud Cemetery renowned as an example of prairie grassland. Besides the Butterfly Weed, we saw prairie grasses (Big and Little Bluestem, Indian grass), New Jersey Tea, Black Oak and many other species. Jock had provided us with plant lists. Efforts are being made to discourage trees and non-native species and at the same time respect the graveyard itself.

After driving through the Northumberland Forest we arrived at our final stop, Peter's Woods Provincial Nature Reserve. A walk through the old growth forest included views of impressively large Sugar Maples; White Oaks, White-Pines and other trees, several of-which Norm estimated to be between 300 and-400 years old. On the ground were a great variety of ferns and other plants. We had discussions about gap-replacement and forest composition and succession.

We thanked Jock for his hospitality and leadership of the tour. A fine time was had by all! Bruce Falls

I am thrilled to be considered for membership in the Brodie Club. I have enjoyed the company of members and I have learne? so much from the fascinating series of lectures presented at the club as a guest of Oliver Bertin, my friend and colleague from the Globe and Mail..

My deeper interest in nature began when, in the mid 1970s I moved to St. Andrew's, New Brunswick, the location of an Environment Canada Fisheries Research Station where my husband worked. The variation of bird life throughout the year (ducks in winter, warblers in the spring, Osprey in the summer and the continually changing shorebird flocks) and the daily changes that come with the tides got me hooked to the observation of nature in action. Since then, I have spent hundreds of hours outdoors observing. I am especially passionate about birds and animals but the changes in mushrooms, wildflowers and trees through the year fascinate me too.
