
The Speaker of the Evening, Dr. Tom McIlwraith, Associate Professor of Geography, University of Toronto, first spoke of his ties with the Brodie Club through his father, Dr. T. F. McIlwraith, formerly of the Department of Anthropology, U. of T. From his strong interest in Ontario geography and history, the Speaker described and illustrated graphically changes in town and farm buildings from pre-Confederation settlements to present-day high-rise apartments, and paid tribute the great resourcefulness of early settlers in meeting their building and farming needs. The Speaker was thanked by Riley for the content and clear expression of his presentation.

Members' Notes and Observations dealt with the recently published "Gore's Landing and the Rice Lake Plains", the habits of black and gray squirrels, behaviour of pileated woodpeckers, the 11,000 year old Hiscock Site near Buffalo, and containing bones of mastodons, caribou and other fauna, and a hawk census in early September near Lake Erie.
