THE 2015 FIELD DAY AND PICNIC OF THE BRODIE CLUB

The annual Field Day and picnic of the Brodie Club took place at the Cawthra Mulock Nature Reserve on Sunday, June 14, 2015. The trip was organized and led by George Bryant. Fifteen Brodie Club members and five guests participated (20 total): Abraham, E. Addison, R. Addison, Bryant, Curry, Dunn, Eadie, A. Falls, B. Falls, Hussell, Iron, Pittaway, J. Rising, T. Rising, Slessor. Guests were Calder and Peter Addison (Addisons), Kathryn Falls (Falls), Steven Rowe and Wendy Day (Risings).

The Cawthra Mulock Nature Reserve was given to Ontario Nature in 2003 by Julyan Mulock and the Cawthra Mulock Foundation. The 108-hectare property is located on the north-west corner of Newmarket.

The group convened in the parking lot at 10 am. The day was overcast and the temperature around 17 C. We passed by an enormous beech tree to a small wetland area, which is part of the larger Ansnorveldt wetland complex and joins with the Holland River before emptying into Cook's Bay of Lake Simcoe. Tracks of a deer and fawn, empty egg shells and nest area of a turtle, and a crayfish burrow were observed along the pond edge. Green frogs, pollywogs, waterboatmen, and backswimmers were observed.

We continued over the bridge, noting the recent beaver activity under the bridge. The trail rose through a section with many planted cedar and pines and opened into old pasture fields where many non-native plants were in flower including Tall goatsbeard *Tragopogon*, Oxeye daisy *Leucanthemum*, Daisy fleabane *Erigeron*. A couple of groups of Black swallow-wart *Cynanchum* were seen. Many butterflies, dragonflies and other flying insects were observed (full list below).

A light shower began just before noon and the group moved to the garden of David and Deirdre Tomlinson on Centre St. in Aurora. Members enjoyed the spectacular gardens and sheltered in the gazebo to share conversation and lunch. As the rain continued in the afternoon, the walk of the wildlife preserve in Aurora was cancelled.

Our thanks to George Bryant for organizing the Field Day and to David and Deirdre Tomlinson for providing us with a lunch location (and juice and cake) out of the rain.
